

PRESENTATION TITLE: A Year of Reading Jewishly PRESENTER: Sylvia Gotlib

TOPIC: Arts & Culture

This popular presentation will focus on 15-20 current titles that are worth considering for anyone's reading list. The session is a short review on each title and integrates current trends in books in general when appropriate.

PRESENTATION TITLE: **Praying, Speaking, Singing Without Words** TOPIC: Spirituality PRESENTER: Micah Caplan

In Hebrew, Niggun means a tune or melody without words. But in Judaism, we can use a Niggun to elevate our emotions and spiritual connections. At times, singing a Niggun can even be a meditative experience. A Niggun can guide our intention towards joy, and help us through our sadness. A Niggun can be an extension of words or stand alone. Come join me to explore the history of Niggunim (plural of Niggun), to explore and join our voices in various melodies, and to connect to your soul.

PRESENTATION TITLE: Water Wars: Israeli Water Usage, Peace and Conflict TOPIC: Israel PRESENTER: David Krantz

Everyone knows that there is precious little fresh water in the Middle East, but where do Israelis and Palestinians get their water? And how can water lead to either tanks or doves? Many wars in the region have been fought over oil – discover why the next war could be over water, and learn about potential solutions.

PRESENTATION TITLE: The 10 Commandments: A Spiritual Blueprint to a Better Life TOPIC: Text & Torah

This session will reveal the inner structure of the Asseret Hadibrot (10 principles) given at Mt. Sinai. A close reading of the text will reveal that this is not God's top 10 list of *mitzvot*, rather it is a comprehensive system that can help us to grow in our spiritual lives and in our relationships with each other.

PRESENTATION TITLE: Humor and Holiness

PRESENTER: Elana Kanter

Laughter can be a very serious matter. The ability to find the humor even in the most dire situations can contribute to the victory of good over evil, of life over death, and of hope over despair. Humor has been a key to Jewish survival, and a powerful tool in our struggle to make the world better. Join Rabbi Kanter in studying some of the ways that Jewish humor and laughter release the spiritually imprisoned and heal those whose spirits have been battered by life. You will laugh while you learn, and learn while you laugh.

CLASS SCHEDULE

PRESENTATION TITLE: Exploring the Tensions of Modernity as Embodied in Chimen Abramsky's Library PRESENTER: Sasha Abramsky TOPIC: Jewish Experience ROOM: MU 226 Graham

Chimen's father was a famous rabbi, who headed London's Beth Din for the better part of twenty years, and won the first Israel Prize for rabbinic literature. Chimen himself was non-religious, a world-class historian who grew up in the interwar years as a Communist, spent two decades immersed in the Communist Party of Great Britain, and then became a leading liberal and anti-Communist. Originally an anti-Zionist, as his attachment to Communism faded, so his sympathies for the young state of Israel grew. In Chimen's library could be found all of the tensions of modern Jewish history: the traditionalists versus the exponents of the the Jewish enlightenment, the Haskalah; internationalism versus Zionism; communism versus liberalism. In my talk, I will explore these tensions, and their implications for today's world.

PRESENTATION TITLE: Resetting the Balance Between Work/Family Responsibility – A New Point of View TOPIC: Life Cycle ROOM: MU 240 Navaio PRESENTER: Ada Anbar

This presentation will reopen the conversation about issues of work/family balance. It will focus on the needs of parents compared with the needs of young children, and how to better bridge the gap between the two. A new transformative solution to the conflict of interest will be presented, based on the recognition that people today have 60 years of adult life (from age 20 to age 80). And if only 10 years out of these 60 years would be devoted to intense parenting, the most basic needs of young children could be better served, to the benefit of the children, their parents, and society at large. Selected readings from different early childhood authorities will be provided.

PRESENTATION TITLE: Living the Weekly Torah Portion PRESENTER: Rachel Isaacs TOPIC: Text & Torah

This class will demonstrate how to break down the narrative and lessons of the Weekly Torah Portion and incorporate them into daily life. The class will discuss fun ideas and concepts to engage children of all ages as well as provide the participants with the resources and tools to do it yourself.

PRESENTATION TITLE: Celebrating the Increasing Diversity of the Jewish Community TOPIC: Jewish Experience PRESENTER: Eva Stern ROOM: MU 246 Coconino

We encounter potential newcomers to our Jewish communities all the time. Some have wonderful first experiences, and find themselves quickly gravitating towards deeper Jewish connection. Unfortunately, many others experience quite the opposite. Given the increasingly diverse backgrounds of teens and young adults today (including those with little or no Jewish background, from interfaith families, in interfaith relationships, or from non-traditional family structures, or those who might have had negative experiences with Jewish life in the past), we have the potential to ensure that their first (and future) encounters with Jewish life are positive! This session welcomes emerging leaders to learn how to find, welcome, and build relationships with teens and young adults.

Everyone is born; everyone dies. Americans can feel uncomfortable talking about death. This sessions aims to have a civilized conversation about how mourners choose to honor the person they loved or had mixed feelings about, incorporating the character of the bereft family and its communities. How do we observe Shiva: traditionally or in a jazz-like riff on the tradition? For the alienated or unaffiliated, intense mourning presents opportunities to reconnect to family and community or faith and to be open to reconciliation. Mourners experience a deeply emotional and evocative time. This session aspires to start with a conversation about the tradition and its wisdom, and to then explore ways that within the truth and essence of Jewish mourning tradition add new possibilities.

PRESENTATION TITLE: The Power of Sharing Our Stories in Song PRESENTER: Marieke Slovin TOPIC: Arts & Culture

ROOM: MU 228 Cochise

"The greatest gift you can give the world is to tell your truth." In this hour long presentation, songwriter Marieke Slovin will offer the opportunity for participants to share their truth and to experience the creative process of songwriting. She will work with group participants to create a unique song using a method she helped to create called Story-to-Song. (STS). Participants will share words and phrases along a common theme to create a shared story. Marieke will then guide the group through the process of shaping their words into lyrics, devising a chorus and verses, and finding a melody. The finished product will be a song the group can sing together.

PRESENTATION TITLE: Translating Creation: A Few Centuries of Controversy PRESENTER: Aviya Kushner

TOPIC: Text & Torah

How we understand creation affects how we read the Bible, and to some extent, how we understand the entire world itself. We'll take a close look at several translations of Genesis 1:1-1:3 from various centuries and faith traditions, and we'll discuss how language shapes belief. Research shows that people who are forgiving of others and themselves tend to be healthier and happier in a number of ways. They also perform higher at work and at play, and are more highly rated by their relationship partners. Given the fact that the world in which we live can be incredibly unforgiving at times. practicing forgiveness - of self and others - can be a challenge. Megan draws on the compelling science and powerful stories she collected while reporting domestically and internationally, as well as her own personal experiences, to provide a profound and insightful pathway to using this age-old concept as a modern and accessible practice to enhance individual health and wellbeing, interpersonal relationships and global relations.

PRESENTATION TITLE: Can a Friendship Help Solve the Israeli-Palestinian Conflict? PRESENTER: Anthony David TOPIC: Israel ROOM: MU 241A Ventana

Publishers Weekly, in its review of my book An Improbable Friendship, writes: "If it hadn't actually occurred, the friendship between Ruth Dayan (born 1917), the first wife of Israeli politician Moshe Dayan, and Raymonda Tawil (born 1940), the mother-in-law of Palestinian leader Yasser Arafat, would seem not merely improbable but impossible." Even more unlikely was how these two women, directly and indirectly, influenced the Israeli-Palestinian peace process. With the Oslo agreement in tatters, is it possible that an improbable friendship, rooted in empathy, can show us ways to cross the seemingly unbridgeable chasm dividing Israelis from Palestinians? Can political lessons be gleaned from a personal friendship?

His books have been translated into 37 languages and over 43 million have been sold world-wide! Join a session filled with laughter and joy as we read some of Ephraim Kishon's best stories, plays and skits. We will try to make sense of Israeli's life an culture through satire and humor. Discussions will be held in English. Texts will be provided in both Hebrew and English.

PRESENTATION TITLE: Balance – A Lithuanian Model PRESENTER: Jarred Elias TOPIC: Jewish Experience

This class will explore the legacy of the Lithuanian Jewish community and delve into how we as a Jewish community can live up to our 21st Century responsibilities by learning from past generations. "Even when the gates of prayer are closed, the gates of tears are open." So says the Talmud (BT Berαchot 32b), and many of us have seen that when the heart is broken, it is also the most open. And yet, much of our contemporary culture (and spirituality) seeks to banish sadness and other difficult emotions. Jay Michaelson's new book The Gate of Tears: Sadness and the Spiritual Path, argues for an integration of joy and sadness, spirituality and social justice. In this talk, he will draw on secular, Hasidic, personal, and Dharma sources (and avoid cliché and psychobabble) to present an authentic contemplative path for today's postmodern age.

PRESENTATION TITLE: Why Your Family History Matters PRESENTER: Marcia Fine TOPIC: Life Cycle

Our history, where we came from, who our relatives were and what happened to them, is part of our daily life. In a historical look at 1920s Poland, 1940s New York City and finally, 1950s Florida, we garner respect for family members who survived. Who left and who stayed? Why? Those are the stories that impact people in our migratory history. Many of us have immigrants in our families. Their sacrifices teach us strength as Marcia shares her grandmother's story and how she preserved it. It is an American story of assimilation based on three generations of women. The novel, PAPER CHILDREN-An Immigrant's Legacy has been a finalist for three national prizes.

Our Shabbat candles here in Phoenix do not just create a "place in time" for ourselves; instead we have had the privilege of sharing Shabbat with a diverse population of people who have never been involved in this weekly ritual. Many guests sit down at our table and ask, "You do this every Friday night?" Hence was born the notion of Shortcuts to Shabbat. Through specially crafted seminars I have taken hundreds of people through a 30-minute Shabbat preparation – from soup to sorbet. My goal is to present simple shortcuts to what looks like hours of work. I ask the participants to imagine their kitchen as an art studio as they creatively arrange their menus and platters. My friends always laugh when I share the words my mom has lived by: "No one will ever write on your tombstone, she made it all from scratch."

A core teaching of Hasidism is that there is no place where God cannot be found. Everything contains some spark of the divine. But what about the dark places within ourselves, the feelings and impulses that we are least proud of? How do we find God there? We will study some texts from the Me'or Eynayim, in which Rabbi Menachem Nachum Twersky of Chernobyl (1730 - 1797) teaches us that we can find God, and redeem ourselves, by uncovering the holy sparks hidden even in the darkest parts of our own personalities.

Let's understand why so few folks participate regularly, and learn simple steps that we - as leaders, or simply concerned Jewish "citizens" - can take to help engage more of our friends and family.

PRESENTATION TITLE: Was a Jewish Woman Behind Shakespeare's Mask? PRESENTER: Steve Weitzenkorn TOPIC: Arts & Culture

Could a Jewish woman and feminist (centuries before the term was coined) written Shakespeare's comedies and some of his most famous dramas? That distinct possibility will be explored, looking at clues and Judaic allegories embedded in the scripts as well as the correlation between her life and the chronology of plays. This woman, Amelia Bassano Lanier, was the daughter of a Venetian musician recruited by Henry VIII, a hidden Jew, and the first female poet (and fourth woman) published in England. Her radical poetic volume, Salve Deus Rex Judaeorum, advocated for women and rebutted Church doctrine that suppressed female aspirations.

PRESENTATION TITLE: Tikkun Olam in Jewish Celebrations PRESENTERS: Rebecca Wolf & Shmuly Yanklowitz

Planning a Jewish celebration or lifecycle event is a time of inner exploration about the way in which one sees him- or herself in the world. It is a time during which one has an opportunity to make a public declaration to the community regarding what values he or she seeks to live by. Rebecca Wolf and Shmuly Yanklowitz discuss tikkun olam as a fundamental tenant of modern Judaism. They provide examples of ways in which Jews in the Greater Phoenix Jewish Community can plan meaningful and thoughtful lifecycle events while considering the Jewish value of tikkun olam.



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

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


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
